PARISH OF PONTEFRACT St Giles' with St Mary

The Vicar writes...

Canon John was reminding us on Sunday 22nd August how the notion of church begins to be introduced in Matthew's gospel. You won't find mention of the term 'ecclesia' (Gk for church) in Mark, Luke or John. We read in the gospel how individuals are called by Jesus. They form a body of disciples, share the faith with others, and it isn't too long before a community is formed which needs to order its life and fellowship together. Within half a century of St Paul's lifetime, the institutional structures are present which help the church to shape its life and mission. Church councils deciding on ecclesiastical and doctrinal matters are mentioned very early in the history of the church as we read in Acts 15!

Matthew, through the story of Jesus' encounter with Peter, reminds us that a personal response to 'Who Jesus is' ('who do you say that I am..') is foundational to the building of his church on earth (I will build my church and the gates of hades shall not prevail against it..'). After all, Jesus is the 'head of the church' as the writer to the Colossians tells us:

*17 He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. 18 **He is the head of the body, the church**; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. 19 For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, 20 and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross (chapter 1).*

'Christ is the head of the body, the church.' As we seek to order our ministry and mission in the ways that the 21st century does, then we need to remember our personal response to Jesus' call on our lives to join Christ's 'body' (His church) in the task of building his church on earth:

'The church exists primarily for two closely correlated purposes: to worship God and to work for his kingdom in the world...The church exists for a third purpose, which serves the other two: to encourage one another, to build one another up in faith, to pray with and for one another, to learn from one another and teach one another, and to set one another examples to follow, challenges to take up, and urgent tasks to perform. This is all part of what is known loosely as fellowship'. (N.T.Wright in 'Simply Christian'..)

The preamble above is to say that fulfilling the role of church warden, PCC member and deanery synod member helps the church to fulfil its vision. The structures of the local church are important and they deserve a prayerful response on our part as we consider the call to serve in such ways and in other ways that help the church to be the church.

So...can you help to fill a vacancy to serve as part of the structures that govern our life and ministry together in Pontefract. Please see below.

St Giles' Annual Meeting

The postponed Annual Vestry and Annual Parochial Church Meetings due to be held on 29th March 2020 **has now been rearranged for 4th OCTOBER** and will take place after the morning service. At the APCM meeting, in order to prevent people remaining too long in church after the service, we will only deal with what is legally necessary. The Annual Report and Agenda which had been prepared for the March meeting will be available on our website, and also via email ahead of the October meeting. Paper copies will be available for the meeting on the day, along with any other papers.

At these meetings, churchwardens are elected for the coming year, together with members of the Parochial Church Councils and representatives to the Deanery Synod. **Nomination forms for all of these roles will in due course be available in church, or by email from Vivienne Smales, our administrator.**

St Giles needs to elect: 4 churchwardens (1 year term), 3 PCC members for 3 years and one casual vacancy for 1 year, also 4 Deanery Synod representatives (3 year term).

Nomination forms should be sent to the parish office or handed to Canon June by Sunday 27th September.

Please prayerfully consider if God is calling you to these roles, and speak to Canon June if you have any questions.

A nestful of robins added surprise natural beauty to an Easter floral display placed outside one of our locked churches.

As the undisturbed flowers stood untouched for weeks during lockdown, enterprising feathered parents made a tiny

nest behind Easter lilies in perfect sanctuary.

Worshipper Irene Truman created the display to go between a locked porch door and a shut gate at St Peter's, East Marton, in the Ripon Episcopal Area.

“With appropriate permission I placed a large floral display in front of the door within the south porch” Irene said.

“I used white Easter lilies together with bright yellow alstroemeria and sunny round-faced orange flame gerbera against a natural frame of beech twigs and variegated greenery from kind neighbours’ gardens.

“The whole effect was constructed to give hope and cheer during 'strange' times.

“It was titled 'Rise and Shine' and beamed hope, joy and cheer out to passing locals doing their daily exercise. It went out with my Easter Blessing,” Irene said.

Mother Nature then added an extra blessing when keen-eyed robins chose



it to construct a nest, lay five eggs and fledge four young chicks.

“Their home was so well camouflaged within the back of the metal container holding my arrangement. And appropriately, fledging took place the day before our churches were allowed to open their doors for private prayer,” Irene said.

“Nature knew it would not be disturbed and used the opportunity to carry on with what it did best. “Maybe we should take notice and come out of our time of being 'locked out' with a greater respect for the natural world and all its glory.”

Note: The robin's red breast comes from Christ's blood on the Cross, which stained the little brown bird as it sang into his ear to ease his suffering, according to British folklore.

A Japanese POW story – VJ75 day, 2020

I have been asked to enlarge upon the item regarding the memorial of my father that appeared in last weeks “Notices” as part of the VJ75 Remembrance Ceremony.

George was born in 1915, the youngest of 10 children. Two other males died in infancy leaving him and seven sisters. His father was a military man serving 25 years in the Field Artillery then recalled for 5 years for WWI.

It perhaps was not surprising with that background, that in 1929 he joined the Kentish Regiment “The Buffs”. At the age of 14!! He served 222 days before his mother reclaimed him from the Army. (No safeguarding then!).

George’s 1929 enlistment papers,

Back in civvy street he trained as an electrician and worked in the building industry. He joined up again at the start of WW2 this time in his father’s regiment the Royal Artillery.

He was posted to Singapore in late 1941 and spent a couple of months there before along with 85,000 other Allied troops was captured by the Japanese after the capitulation of Allied forces in Singapore, on 15 February 1942. It was the largest surrender of British-led forces in history.

In April 1942 the Seabridge enquiry for the Cabinet argued that the surrender was not justified at that time because;

They were not short of food & water (no rationing)

Plenty of fuel

Well-equipped troops

Poor moral due to speed of Japanese advance

Japanese propaganda believed by Asiatic forces

Churchill's statement to House "we will defend Johor (the other end of the causeway linking Singapore to the mainland) foot by foot" whilst evacuating defenders to Singapore.



No counter attack ordered, there were 5,000 invaders 60,000 defenders. Subsequent atrocities on the island have been well documented in other places.

George and thousands of others were sent to Prisoner of War camps throughout Asia. He was sent to Malaya and Thailand where thousands were forced to work on the Burma Railway.

The use of two atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki together with the Russian invasion of Manchuria forced the Japanese to surrender on 15th of August 1945, 75 years ago.

Those that served in Malaya/Singapore did not qualify for the Burma Star, but were awarded the Pacific medal instead.

George like so many others never talked about the war. I have gleaned this information from inherited papers, relatives and the internet.

These hand painted pictures on rice paper were found in a book for safekeeping. His then wife, my step mother, told me they were exchanged for a packet of Players by a Japanese guard after they surrendered.



After the war he moved to London, then to Reading where he worked at Harwell, the Atomic Energy Research Establishment which developed nuclear reactors for electricity generation.

Services at St Giles'

As services re-commence at St Giles' the service sheet every Sunday contains the following advice which hopefully will reassure you if you are hoping to return soon.

We continue to pray for all who are yet to feel able to join us physically, all affected by Covid-19, all working to relieve the suffering of others, all who are unwell, concerned, afraid or alone, all baptism families and wedding couples who have been forced to delay these important occasions, and all awaiting ordination in our diocese.

Please comply with the following to ensure a safer environment for everyone.

- In the light of recent government guidance and guidance from the Church of England, it is now mandatory (a legal requirement) to wear a face mask in church . Exemptions include - young children under the age of 11, people advised medically not to do so, people with a disability that makes the handling of masks difficult, those for whom it would cause mental distress. Further details on exemptions can be found here - <https://www.churchofengland.org/sites/default/files/2020-08/COVID%2019%20advice%20on%20face%20coverings%20v3%20DRAFT.pdf>
- Those who are leading services (generally clergy) or events in a place of worship, and those who assist them (for instance by reading, preaching, or leading prayer) do not always need to wear a face covering, although one should be worn especially if physical distancing cannot be maintained (i.e. distributing consumables)
- Please help to keep a period of quiet reflection before our worship begins.
- RECORDS of all attending services are kept for track and trace purposes - these are kept securely and destroyed after 21 days
- Please respect DISTANCING, and do not gather together anywhere indoors before or after the service. Household 'bubbles' may sit together, as directed by the sides-people.
- Singing is not currently permitted for congregations. Recent government legislation (August 15th) will allow us in due course to use a small group of choir members to sing hymns/choral music in the service.

- Please do not raise your voice when making the responses
- We remain seated to share the PEACE verbally only.
- WAFERS will be covered and will not be touched before you receive them. The wafer which is handled and consumed by the Priest is kept separate. The CHALICE will not be shared (the priest will consecrate and consume the wine, maintaining the validity of the Eucharistic celebration) - receiving in one kind only, we receive the fullness of Christ's blessing in Holy Communion.
- When it is time to receive HOLY COMMUNION, please allow the sides-people to direct you when to move. Sanitise your hands as directed. When you reach the priest, please stretch out your hands and the bread will be placed into them. The priest will wear a face-covering.
- You will need to sanitise your hands (top of middle aisle) before moving down the aisle to receive communion and ahead of touching/removing your mask to receive the bread.
- Communion can be brought to you in your seat if you're unable to come forward, please let the wardens know, and sit near an aisle.
- BLESSINGS will not involve the laying on of hands (ie the priest will not touch the head of the person receiving the blessing).
- A TOILET is available, but please avoid any queueing inside the toilet area.
- Please take this BOOKLET with you and recycle it
- Please leave your COLLECTION in the plate near to the exit.. No offertory will be presented.
- Candles can be lit after the service as directed by a sides-person
