## WELCOME TO WORSHIP- helping to keep each other safe.

- **MOBILE PHONES**—To avoid loss of signal when livestreaming the service, would you please either turn your phone off or put it onto 'Airplane Mode' in settings
- **FACE MASKS** – must be worn unless you are exempt
- **TEST AND TRACE** – Please give your details to the sidesperson or use the NHS 'Test and Trace' app
- **HAND HYGIENE** – Please sanitise on entry and exit and before receiving communion
- **SOCIAL DISTANCING** – The 2 metres rule to be followed, or if not possible 1 metre plus with mitigations
- **SEATING ARRANGEMENTS** – You will be seated in appropriate seats by the sidespeople
- **SERVICE SHEETS** – Please take home with you
- **MUSIC, SINGING AND RESPONSES** - Singing is not currently permitted for congregations. A small choral group is permitted. All responses will be said using a quiet voice
- **THE PEACE** – please only share by a smile or wave
- **RECEIVING COMMUNION** – The sidespeople will direct you. Please sanitise your hands as directed. When you reach the priest, please remove your mask and stretch out your hands.
- **AT THE END OF THE SERVICE** - Please remain in your seat until a steward asks you to leave, and then please go directly to the designated exit as guided by them. Mingling amongst groups is not permitted by law indoors and outdoors. The rule of six applies.
- **FOOD AND DRINK** – sadly, there can be no refreshments available after the service.
- **LIGHTING OF CANDLES** – can be done after the service.
- **TOILETS** -Toilet facilities are available, but only one person will be able to enter the toilet area at a time to ensure social distancing.
- **TITHES AND OFFERINGS** – please place onto the plate near the exit door.

## The Liturgy of the Word

### Old Testament Reading      Isaiah 52.13-53.12

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

See, my servant shall prosper;  
he shall be exalted and lifted up,  
and shall be very high.

Just as there were many who were astonished at him—  
so marred was his appearance, beyond human semblance,  
and his form beyond that of mortals —  
so he shall startle many nations;  
kings shall shut their mouths because of him;  
for that which had not been told them they shall see,  
and that which they had not heard they shall contemplate.

Who has believed what we have heard?  
And to whom has the arm of the LORD been revealed?  
For he grew up before him like a young plant,

and like a root out of dry ground;  
he had no form or majesty that we should look at him,  
nothing in his appearance that we should desire him.  
He was despised and rejected by others;  
a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity;  
and as one from whom others hide their faces  
he was despised,  
and we held him of no account.

Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases;  
yet we accounted him stricken,  
struck down by God, and afflicted.  
But he was wounded for our transgressions,  
crushed for our iniquities;  
upon him was the punishment that made us whole,  
and by his bruises we are healed.  
All we like sheep have gone astray;  
we have all turned to our own way,  
and the LORD has laid on him  
the iniquity of us all.

He was oppressed, and he was afflicted,  
yet he did not open his mouth;  
like a lamb that is led to the slaughter,  
and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent,  
so he did not open his mouth.  
By a perversion of justice he was taken away.  
Who could have imagined his future?  
For he was cut off from the land of the living,  
stricken for the transgression of my people.  
They made his grave with the wicked  
and his tomb with the rich,  
although he had done no violence,  
and there was no deceit in his mouth.

Yet it was the will of the LORD to crush him with pain.  
When you make his life an offering for sin,  
he shall see his offspring, and shall prolong his days;  
through him the will of the LORD shall prosper.

Out of his anguish he shall see light;  
he shall find satisfaction through his knowledge.  
The righteous one, my servant, shall make many righteous,  
and he shall bear their iniquities.  
Therefore I will allot him a portion with the great,  
and he shall divide the spoil with the strong;  
because he poured out himself to death,  
and was numbered with the transgressors;  
yet he bore the sin of many,  
and made intercession for the transgressors.

## New Testament Reading      Hebrews 10.16-25

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

The Holy Spirit testifies to us, for after saying,  
‘This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days,  
says the Lord:  
I will put my laws in their hearts,  
and I will write them on their minds’,  
he also adds,

‘I will remember their sins and their lawless deeds no more.’  
Where there is forgiveness of these, there is no longer any offering for sin.  
Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by  
the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through  
the curtain (that is, through his flesh), and since we have a great priest over  
the house of God, let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith,  
with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies  
washed with pure water. Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope  
without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider  
how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to  
meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all  
the more as you see the Day approaching.

*A wooden cross is placed in the sight of the people.*

*These words are used.*

Behold the wood of the cross, on which hung the Saviour of the world.

**Come, let us worship.**

O Saviour of the world,  
who by your cross and precious blood have redeemed us,  
**save us and help us, we humbly pray.**

*A short time of silent devotion is observed.*

*The minister says these devotions.*

We glory in your cross, O Lord,  
and praise you for your mighty resurrection;  
**for by virtue of your cross joy has come into our world.**

God be gracious to us and bless us:  
**and make his face shine upon us,**

Let your ways be made known on earth:  
**your liberating power among all nations.**

Let the peoples praise you, O God:  
**let all the peoples praise you.**

We glory in your cross, O Lord,  
and praise you for your mighty resurrection;

**for by virtue of your cross joy has come into our world.**

Almighty God,  
as we stand at the foot of the cross of your Son,  
may we know your love for us,  
that in humility, love and joy  
we may place at his feet  
all that we have and all that we are;  
through Jesus Christ our Saviour.

## The Lord's Prayer

Remember us Lord in your heavenly kingdom,  
as we your children unite our prayers with your Son.

# Giving of Communion

*The president says the invitation to communion*

Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world.

Happy are those who are called to his supper.

**Lord, I am not worthy to receive you,  
but only say the word, and I shall be healed.**

*The President and people receive communion.*

*Communion is taken from the Reserved sacrament consecrated on Maundy Thursday.*

The body of Christ broken for you. **Amen.**

*Those who feel unable or do not wish to receive communion at the moment, may use this prayer silently as a spiritual act of communion.*

**In union, O Lord with the faithful at every altar of your Church,  
where the Holy Eucharist is celebrated, I desire to offer you praise  
and thanksgiving.**

**I present to you my soul and body with the earnest wish that I may  
always be united to you. And since I cannot now receive you  
sacramentally, I ask you to come spiritually into my heart. I unite  
myself to you, and embrace you with all the affections of my soul.  
Let nothing ever separate you from me. May I live and die in your  
love.**

**Amen.**

# The Conclusion

*Silence is kept.*

O Lord Jesus Christ,  
Son of the living God,  
set your passion, cross and death  
between your judgement and our souls,  
now and in the hour of our death.  
Grant mercy and grace to the living,  
rest to the departed,  
to your Church peace and concord  
and to us sinners forgiveness,  
and everlasting life and glory;  
for, with the Father and the Holy Spirit,  
you are alive and reign,  
God, now and for ever.

This relates to Station XI as Jesus is nailed to the cross

See, as they strip the robe from off his back  
And spread his arms and nail them to the cross,  
The dark nails pierce him and the sky turns black,  
And love is firmly fastened onto loss.  
But here a pure change happens. On this tree  
Loss becomes gain, death opens into birth.  
Here wounding heals and fastening makes free  
Earth breathes in heaven, heaven roots in earth.

Where sin meets grace and darkness turns to light  
We see what love can bear and be and do,
